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The site is in a garden to the North of the farm buildings on a small terrace immediately east of the small river. It appears to be a natural terrace of the river at about 2-3 m. The finds have been made over several years when digging the garden. The main group was given to E.K. Tratman in May 1970. The finds consist of a nondescript collection of flint pieces with perhaps one poor end scraper. The flint nodules are obviously dervied from the chalk and there is one honey-coloured piece of chert rather like some of the material from Broom.

The gravel lies above the clay. There is no history tog suggest that the flints were brought by previous owners of the farm to the site. Provisional identification is either Neolithic or Mesolithic Owner of farm Cmdr. D.N. Hoare who found the pieces.

Cmdr. Hoare askked to collect more and to look for smaller items.

The site is also at a ford across the river and a footpath, which N.E. runs to Stanton Drew, passes through the farm.
