G.B. Cave

During the past year, two minor falls of rock have occurred from the underside of the Bridge. On the upstream side a number of cracks have appeared and are slowly widening. Further falls are likely to take place and collapse of the whole structure may occur.

Eastwater.

During August 1960 a fall of rock took place in the Boulder Ruckle resulting in a fatal accident. Inspection by experts from the Mendip Rescue organisation led to the owner of the land putting the cave 'out of bounds'. A recent inspection was made involving the recce of a new route. A guide wire has been laid and the danger zone is clearly signposted. It cannot be too strongly emphasised that to proceed beyond the DANGER signs is both foolhardy and dangerous.

Archaeology.

Excavations in Long Hole, Cheddar, were started in the early part of January. Extreme difficulty is being experienced in locating a site that has not been disturbed. Portions of stalagmite floor 'in situ' have been found and it is hoped that the undisturbed layers beneath them will prove fruitful.

Library.
