Subscriptions

At the A.G.M. the amendments to Rules 6c and 6d, as proposed in the last Circular, were proposed and carried. In effect this will mean that for the financial year 1965/66 the subscriptions will be £1 los. and £2 for ex-student members and outside members respectively.

Subscriptions at the old rate for 1964/65 are now payable to the Hon. Treasurer.

Accounts

The Income and Expenditure Account and Balance Sheet are included in this Circular. At the A.G.M. the Hon. Treasurer made the following comments.

Income. Members' subscriptions down a bit, because of one death, 4 resignations and 4 unpaid subs. against 2 new members. This year there are 70 members at 1, 21 at 21 los. p.a. and 4 honorary.

G.B. Cave tackle expenditure balances income, as it should do, but the future is very doubtful, because of increased expenditure (legal fees, etc.) and uncertain tackle fees (permit system now operates).

Interest: £10 earmarked for proceedings, the rest unallocated.

Sales: same as last year (then a record), which is satisfactory.

Transfer of 550 (capital) from Printed Publications Fund (the maximum allowed in one year by the rules) conceals a real deficit of some 540.

Expenditure. Froceedings cost £33 more than expected. Of the other items, some were more expensive and some less than the estimates, and so cancelled one another out.

Balance Sheet. Hut Levy augments Hut Fund, plus a little allocation of interest. Brean Down rublication Fund unchanged. A set of "Atercrombie" has been bought out of War Damage Replacement A/c. Printed rublication Fund has been augmented by a donation of 2200 under the same conditions as the original. It is however to be regarded as replaceable rather than expendable. Library Fund is used for binding volumes. Hay Wood Publication A/c is a new account established this year by an anonymous donation for the purpose of publishing the write-up on the Hay Wood Rock Shelter in Proceedings. The excavations at this site were done by the Axbridge C.G. & Arch. Soc. Any surplus is to go into the U.F.S.S. General Account.

Encashment of £30 of Defence Bonds enabled us to transfer money from Printed sublications Fund to the I. & E. A/c. Sundry Debtor is the Colston Research Grant, as usual. Of the Belance at the Bank of £365 8s.6d., £350 is new donations. £330 of this has been invested in 4½% Defence Bonds (the best now available). The difference of £20 is that part of the Printed sublications Fund which was transfered to the I. & E. A/c. without encashment of investments.

CAVING TRIP TO CZECHOSLOVAKIA

A small caving party is going to Czechoslovakia from August . 15th to 30th, 1964. The party is in some measure being sponsored by the government of that country but the exact extent of the sponsorship is not known. The main object of the trip is to study the karstic phenomena of the country and this may perhaps involve crossing into Russia. This is a privately arranged party but at present there are vacancies for three U.B.S.S. members.

The party would travel from Lydd by air car ferry to Calais and return by the same route. It will take two days of hard driving each way to cover the distance, leaving approximately twelve days to see the country.

This will be earmarked for use on the Society's "away" trips and will not be kept on Mendip. Its cost is not yet known but will be in the neighbourhood of \$25. This is more than the Society can afford on the 1964 budget and members are asked for donations. The effects of increased subscriptions will not be felt for about two years, and it is thought that members who attend our trips to Yorkshire, for example, might like to help to buy the tackle necessary for our expeditions. Will they please send their donations to the Hon. Treasurer and make out cheques in favour of the U.F.S.S.
